

### Four weeks in Lent

Week 3 in our Lent readings series. John 19 v 16-42.

The death and burial of Jesus.

Take some time this week, or even today, to find a quiet place and read through the narrative of the first Easter,

Sense what was going through the characters minds and emotions as they tried to make sense of what was happening!

## Hymns and their stories Were vou there

The first publication of this stirring spiritual appeared in 1899 in William E. Barton's Old Plantation Hymns, a commentary on spirituals.

Barton states in his book that he first heard this spiritual sung "in the South" without mentioning further specifics. However, Barton does note that the song likely originated in the African American slave community.

Further research on the spiritual's origin confirms that its roots are impossible to trace, as the song wasn't written by an individual songwriter but arose out of the collective slave experience of oppression and suffering.

In the lyrics Barton provided, the first stanza recalls the Lord's Crucifixion by metaphorically asking the listener:

Were you there when they crucified my Lord?

Were you there when they crucified mv Lord?

Oh! Sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble.

Were you there when they crucified my Lord? The singer is asking the listener to embrace the gravity and purpose of the Crucifixion and, through doing so, be transformed in the here and now.

# My Bible—My Story

'I always believed in God. When I was a child, I wanted to go to church to join the choir. When I was ten, I helped teach the other children, which probably wouldn't be allowed now! But when you do that, you become much more aware of what you are reading.

'It was when I was 14 and joined the Christian Union at school that things really changed though.

They gave us a pamphlet and in it was Revelation 3.20, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him and will sup with him."

'Reading that was the moment when I changed from being a church member to having a personal relationship with Christ. It was 15 March 1973. 'For me, that is a life-changing verse. I have contentment about whatever happens in life. I believe that everything that happens is God's plan. 'It also changed the course of my life. I became a reader in the local church and a hospital chaplain. I'm a very quiet sort of person but I love making



a difference, so I guess that verse has had an impact on other people, not just me. I love being able to be with people and let them feel that there is somebody there who understands.

### The biblical significance of the number 40

The number 40 is a significant biblical number. In Genesis, the flood was after 40 days and nights of rain (Genesis 7.12, 17).

Moses and the Hebrews spent 40 years in the wilderness (Deuteronomy 29.5). Moses fasted for 40 days on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34.28). Nineveh had 40 days to repent (Jonah 3.4).

In the New Testament, Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness, and later Jesus spent 40 days after the resurrection before his ascension (Acts 1.3). In fact, in many languages the word used for Lent comes from the Latin Quadragesima meaning fortieth including Y Grawys in Welsh, Cuaresma in Spanish, Carême in French, and Quaresima in Italian.
